Introduction

The RUGGEDCOM RST916C is a 16-port utility-grade, fully managed Ethernet switch specifically designed to operate reliably in electrically harsh and climatically demanding environments.

• Removable SFP Transceivers

The device supports up to four Small Form-factor Portable (SFP) transceivers, allowing the device to be adapted to the requirements of the network application. A wide array of 1 Gbps and 10 Gbps transceivers are available.

• Fixed Ethernet Ports

In addition to removable SFP transceivers, the device also features 12 standard 10/100/1000Base-TX fixed copper Ethernet ports for Local Area Network (LAN) access.

Configuration and Licensing Plug (CLP)

The CLP is is a removable media for storing configuration files, product licenses, and software updates for the purpose of backup and transfer to other devices. A protective cover is provided to prevent the ingress of dust and dirt when the CLP is not in use.

• Built for Harsh Environments

The device provides a high level of immunity to electromagnetic interference, heavy electrical surges, extreme temperatures and humidity for reliable operation in harsh environments.

The device features IP40 degree protection and does not use internal fans for cooling.

The device supports an extended operating temperature range of -40 to 85 $^{\circ}$ C (-40 to 185 $^{\circ}$ F).

Compact Design

The small form factor of the RUGGEDCOM RST916C allows for installation in space-limited cabinets and on DIN rails.

AC/DC Power Support



1.4 Decommissioning and disposal

Installing the Device

This chapter describes how to install the device, including mounting the device, connecting power, and connecting the device to the network.



$oldsymbol{\Lambda}$ danger

2.1 General Procedure

The general procedure for installing the device is as follows:

2.2 Unpacking the device

When unpacking the device, do the following:

- 1. Inspect the package for damage before opening it.
- 2. Visually inspect each item in the package for any physical damage.
- 3. Verify all items are included.

Note

If any item is missing or damaged, contact Siemens for assistance.

2.3 Mounting the Device

The RUGGEDCOM RST916C is designed for maximum mounting and display flexibility. It can be equipped with adapters that allow it to be attached to a DIN rail or panel.

Note

Heat generated by the device is channeled outwards from the enclosure. As such, it is recommended that 2.5 cm (1 in) of space be maintained on all open sides of the device to allow for some convectional airflow.

Forced airflow is not required. However, any increase in airflow will result in a reduction of ambient temperature and improve the long-term reliability of all equipment mounted in the rack space.

Note

For detailed dimensions of the device with either DIN rail or panel hardware installed, refer to "Dimension Drawings" (Page 31).

2.3.1 Mounting the Device on a DIN Rail

The RUGGEDCOM RST916C is equipped with a DIN rail adapter preinstalled on the back of the chassis. Use the adapter to mount the device to a standard 35 mm (1.4 in) by 15 mm (0.6 in) IEC/EN 60715 or TS35 DIN rail.


Mounting the Device

To mount the device to a DIN rail, do the following:

Hook the top teeth of the adapter onto the DIN rail.

Note

The adapter features a sliding release with a slot at the bottom for a flathead screwdriver.

- ② DIN Rail Adapter


Figure 2.1 Mounting the Device to a DIN Rail

- 2. Insert a flathead screwdriver into the slot of the sliding release and move it down.
- 3. Push the device against the bottom of the DIN rail, then let go of the sliding release to latch the device.

Removing the Device

To remove the device from a DIN rail, do the following:

1. Insert a flathead screwdriver into the slot of the sliding release and move it down.




- ① DIN Rail

- 2. Swing the bottom of the device away from the DIN rail.
- 3. Lift the device off the DIN rail.

2.3.2 Mounting the Device to a Panel

For panel installations, the RUGGEDCOM RST916C can be equipped with panel adapters that allow the device to be attached to a panel in either a rear-mount or side-mount orientation.



To mount the device to a panel, do the following:


1. Secure the mounting adapters to the top and bottom of the device in the desired orientation using the eight M4 screws included with the device.

- 2. Prepare mounting holes in the panel where the device is to be installed.
- 3. Place the device against the panel and align the adapters with the mounting holes.

4. Secure the adapters to the panel with screws.

2.4 Connecting the Failsafe Alarm Relay

The failsafe relay can be configured to latch based on alarm conditions. The NO (Normally Open) contact is closed when the unit is powered and there are no active alarms. If the device is not powered or if an active alarm is configured, the relay opens the NO contact and closes the NC (Normally Closed) contact.

Note

Control of the failsafe relay output is configurable through RUGGEDCOM RST916C. One common application for this relay is to signal an alarm if a power failure occurs. For more information, refer to the "RUGGEDCOM ROS Configuration Manual" for the RUGGEDCOM RST916C.

To connect the failsafe alarm relay, do the following:

1. Insert the failsafe alarm relay terminal block into the device and tighten the screws.





Figure 2.6 Assembling the Failsafe Alarm Relay Terminal Block

2.5 Connecting Power

The RUGGEDCOM RST916C features two input terminals that allow the device to be powered by:

- Up to one independent AC and one independent DC power source
- Two independent DC power sources

Note

The RUGGEDCOM RST916C is a dual input power supply system. Due to this structure, induced voltages will be observed between the positive/live and chassis/ground terminals, and between the negative/neutral and chassis/ground terminals.



Electrical hazard - risk of damage to the device

Do not connect more than one HI AC/DC power supply to the device. Connecting more than one HI AC power supply could result in electrical damage to the device.

riangle notice

Electrical hazard - risk of power disruption

Due to power supply safety features, some AC/DC voltage will be coupled to the redundant power terminals (between the positive/live and chassis/ground terminals, and between the negative/neutral and chassis/ground terminals). While the maximum amount of current transfer is below the safety threshold, it may be enough to trip some external Ground Fault Circuit Interrupter (GFCI) breakers. Before connecting power, review the installation and make sure this condition can be supported.

Note

- For 110/230 VAC rated equipment, an appropriately rated AC circuit breaker must be installed.
- For 125/250 VDC rated equipment, an appropriately rated DC circuit breaker must be installed.
- Use minimum #16 gage copper wiring when connecting terminal blocks.
- Equipment must be installed according to applicable local wiring codes and standards.

2.5.1 Connecting AC or DC Power

The device features dual power supply inputs to allow for redundant connections to separate, independent power supplies. Each power supply terminal block provides reverse polarity protection.

2.5.1 Connecting AC or DC Power

Each variant of the RUGGEDCOM RST916C features dual power supply inputs to allow for redundant connections to separate, independent external power supplies. Depending on the device variant, the following are supported:

- One AC power source and one DC power source
- Two DC power sources

Each power supply terminal block provides reverse polarity protection.

To connect an external AC or DC power source to the device, do the following:

Note

Electrocution hazard - risk of personal injury

When only one AC/DC power source is connected to the device, the redundant power terminals (between the positive/live and chassis/ground terminals, and between the negative/neutral and chassis/ground terminals) are energized. To prevent contact with the terminals and avoid an electrical shock, do the following when one AC/DC power source is connected to the device:

- Make sure a terminal block is installed in the unused port and that any wires from the secondary terminal block are properly terminated
- Make sure the first power source is off before connecting (or disconnecting) a second power source
- If connecting a secondary power source, make sure the power source currently connected to the device is disabled (e.g. power cable is unplugged from the wall receptacle).
- 2. Insert the appropriate terminal block(s) into the device and tighten both screws.




Figure 2.8 Assembling the Power Terminal Blocks

Torque all terminal connections to 0.6 N·m (5 lbf-in).


3. Connect the power cable to the device as follows:

HI AC/DC Power Supply

- Connect the Line wire (AC) or Positive wire (DC) to the positive/ live (+/L) terminal on the terminal block.
- 2. Connect the Neutral wire (AC) or Negative wire (DC) to the negative (PC) neutral (-/N) terminal on the terminal block.
- Connect the ground wire to the chassis/ground terminal on the terminal block.

LO DC Power supply


- 1. Connect the Positive wire to the positive (+) terminal on the terminal block.
- 2. Connect the Negative wire to the negative (-) terminal on the terminal block.
- 3. Connect the ground wire to the chassis/ground terminal on the terminal block.

HI AC/DC Terminal Block Wiring




- ① Positive (+) Terminal

2.5.2 Wiring Examples

4. Connect the chassis ground screw to ground (Potential Earth). It is recommended to terminate the ground connection with an M4 ring or spade lug, and then torque to 1.7 N·m (15 lbf-in).

5. Connect the external power supply to a power source. The **Power** LED on the device will turn green when power is being supplied to the device.





Figure 2.12 Single HI AC Power Input Configuration

Figure 2.13 Single HI DC Power Input Configuration






Figure 2.14 D




Figure 2.16 Single LO DC Power Input Configuration




Figure 2.17 Dual LO DC Power Input Configuration

2.5.2 Wiring Examples

Device Management

This section describes how to connect to and manage the device.

3.1 Connecting to the Device

The following describes the various methods for accessing the RUGGEDCOM RST916C console and Web interfaces on the device. For more detailed instructions, refer to the "RUGGEDCOM ROS Configuration Manual" for the RUGGEDCOM RST916C.

Console Port

Connect a workstation directly to the USB Type-B console port to access the boot-time control and RUGGEDCOM RST916C interfaces. The console port provides access to RUGGEDCOM RST916C's console interface.

Note

Console ports are intended to be used only as a temporary connection during initial configuration or troubleshooting.

Note

For Microsoft Windows users, the RUGGEDCOM USB Serial Console driver must be installed on the users workstation before connecting via the USB Type-B console port. For more information, refer to the "RUGGEDCOM ROS Configuration Manual" for the RUGGEDCOM RST916C.

3.2 Configuring the Device

3.2 Configuring the Device

Once the device is installed and connected to the network, it must be configured. All configuration management is done via the RUGGEDCOM RST916C interface. For more information about configuring the device, refer to the "RUGGEDCOM ROS Configuration Manual" associated with the installed software release.

3.3 Inserting/Removing the CLP

The following describes how to insert and remove the Configuration and Licensing Plug (CLP).



Security hazard - risk of unauthorized access and/or exploitation

Make sure to remove the CLP before decommissioning the device or sending the device to a third-party.

riangle notice

Mechanical/electrical hazard - risk of damage to the CLP

- Do not expose the CLP to extreme temperatures or humidity
- Do not expose the CLP to large magnetic or static electric fields
- Do not bend or drop the CLP

Contamination hazard - risk of equipment damage

A blank insert is included with the device. Use the blank insert when the CLP is removed to prevent the ingress of water, dirts and other debris.

Removing the CLP


To remove the CLP, do the following:



Configuration hazard - risk of data loss

After uploading or downloading a file, allow at least twenty seconds before removing the CLP to ensure the data has been fully transferred.

1. Remove the CLP (or blank insert) from the **CLP** port. If needed, insert a flat head screwdriver between the CLP and the chassis to gently pry the CLP out.

When the CLP is not installed, make sure a blank insert (provided with each device) is installed in its place.








Figure 4.2 RJ45 Ethernet Port Pin Configuration




Figure 5.1 Overall Dimensions




Figure 5.2 Panel Mount Dimensions (Rear Mount Orientation)




Figure 5.3 Panel Mount Dimensions (Side Mount Orientation)


